

The awards include:

Statewide Programs:

- \$261,180 to the Texas Department of Public Safety Regional Victim Services Project to increase services provided to victims across the state in rural counties and other areas where victim service personnel may not be available. Regional counselors, stationed locally, will provide information and referrals, hospital and court accompaniment, and victim liaison services with law enforcement.
- \$188,548 to the Texas Advocacy Project Inc. Family and Sexual Violence Project for victims of sexual assault and domestic violence throughout the state by providing emergency legal advice and referrals through toll-free hotlines, and by assisting victims with the preparation of protective orders.
- \$1,631,479 to the Texas State Mothers Against Drunk Driving Statewide Victim Services Project to meet the immediate and ongoing needs of victims of collisions involving intoxicated drivers. This project will help victims across the state by providing immediate crisis response in hospitals and by conducting debriefings at local schools following crashes. Victim advocates will provide information and/or referrals, personal and legal advocacy, crisis counseling and peer support groups.
- \$365,639 to the Legal Aid of Northwest Texas Rural Safe at Home Project to provide experienced attorneys, stationed locally throughout northwest Texas, to assist victims of domestic violence. These attorneys will provide emergency legal aid, including advice, representation and access to various benefit programs.
- \$4,351,423 to Texas Court Appointed Special Advocates (CASA) Inc. to expediently move victims of child abuse to safe homes by administering sub-contracts to local CASA programs throughout the state.

Central Texas:

- \$74,870 to the Bell County District Attorney Victim Assistance Program to serve as a liaison between victims of crime and the attorneys prosecuting their offenders in Bell County by explaining the complexities of the legal system. Victim assistance staff members will accompany victims to pre-trial meetings with prosecutors and to court.
- \$77,186 to the Brazos County Rape Crisis Center Youth Violence, Sexual Assault, Sexual Abuse and Victims Assistance project to respond to the immediate emotional and physical needs of victims of sexual assault, child molestation, and stalking in Brazos, Burleson, Leon, Madison, Washington, Grimes and Robertson counties. Services include crisis counseling, both in-person and through the 24-hour hotline, individual and group counseling, and accompaniment to emergency rooms, police departments and courts.
- \$73,487 to the City of San Saba Dove Project to provide immediate crisis counseling, referrals to shelters; court accompaniment; assistance with filing applications for crime victims' compensation; referral services to lawyers who will provide assistance with protective orders; and assistance in writing statements for police reports.

- \$49,979 to the Coryell County Crime Victims' Office to provide services to victims of sexual assault and domestic and child abuse. Services will include crisis counseling, peer support groups, transportation to medical and legal appointments, assistance with obtaining protective orders, and information about the criminal justice system.
- \$168,302 to the Family Abuse Center Non-Residential Victims Services project to work with the City of Waco Police Department to provide on-site individual crisis counseling to victims of family violence in McLennan, Falls, Hill, Bosque, Limestone and Freestone counties. Other services include assistance creating safety plans, explanation of the legal process, and accompaniment to court or other appointments.
- \$55,516 to the Communities in Schools Bell-Coryell Counties Inc. Child Victims Advocate project to provide school children, who are victims of crime, with crisis counseling, assistance in filing compensation claims, personal advocacy services, home visits, and other follow-up services to help promote student success in school.
- \$16,607 to the McLennan County Victim Assistance Coordinator project to assist victims through the criminal justice system by providing notification of rights and court proceedings, assistance with protective orders, accompaniment to court, and provision of referrals to other community resources.
- \$99,845 to the Scotty's House Brazos Valley Child Advocacy Center Services for Child Abuse Victims project to provide assistance to child abuse victims, and their non-offending family members, in Brazos, Burleson, Grimes, Leon, Madison, Robertson and Washington counties. These services include child-friendly forensic interviews in a safe environment, referring victims to community services, assistance with applying for Crime Victims' Compensation benefits, and providing individual, family and group counseling.
- \$72,462 to the Twin City Mission Project SAFE for domestic violence victims in Brazos, Burleson, Grimes, Leon, Madison, Robertson and Washington counties. Services include providing emotional support, professional therapy, transportation to criminal justice or social services appointments, accompaniment to court, and information about their rights as victims.
- \$110,800 to the Children's Advocacy Center of Central Texas to services for child abuse victims and their non-offending families in Bell and Coryell counties. Services will include coordinating efforts with law enforcement, family protection workers and prosecutors so young victims of violence only have to conduct one videotaped forensic interviews.
- \$100,398 to the Advocacy Center for Crime Victims and Children's Victim Services project to provide crime victims services in Bosque, Falls, Freestone, Hill, Limestone and McLennan counties, including a 24-hour crisis hotline, hospital accompaniment for sexual assault exams, and individual, family and group counseling to promote recovery.
- \$38,859 to the Hill County Crime Victims Assistance Program to provide victims with phone and in-person information and referrals, accompaniment to legal and medical appointments, assistance with filing crime victims compensation claims, information on crime victim's rights.

East Texas:

- \$160,000 to the Kilgore Community Crisis Center Crime Victims Outreach project to respond to the emotional and physical needs of victims in Gregg, Harrison, Panola, and Rusk counties. Services include crisis counseling, sexual assault and family violence support groups, guidance

through the legal process, transportation to appointments or services, safe shelter through the Kilgore facility, and assistance with completing financial aid forms.

- \$80,000 to the Aid to Victims of Domestic Abuse Legal Advocacy Program to provide victims of domestic abuse and sexual assault in Harris County with guidance in obtaining legal representation, court accompaniment, referrals to community resources, assistance with filing for protective orders.
- \$80,000 to the Bay Area Turning Point Inc. Victim Assistance Services project to help domestic abuse and sexual assault victims in Harris County by providing crisis counseling, assistance with the legal and court processes to include protective orders, and shelter services.
- \$159,732 to the New Horizon Family Center Victim Assistance Program to help domestic violence and sexual assault victims in Harris, Liberty, and Chambers counties by providing crisis counseling, therapeutic counseling and assistance in filing temporary protective orders.
- \$66,042 to the Brazoria County District Attorney's Crime Victim Assistance Program to help victims of crime by providing court accompaniment, referrals for protective orders, assistance with crime victim compensation applications, and information on and referrals to appropriate social service agencies.
- \$64,372 to the Brazoria County Community Supervision and Corrections Department Victim Services Program to help victims whose offenders have been placed on probation. Services will include assistance with receiving restitution, compensation claims or appeals, court accompaniment, legal mediation on the victims' behalf, as well as preparation of victim's statements for use by prosecutors.
- \$32,500 to the City of Houston Police Storefront Crisis Team to help victims in Harris County by providing on-scene crisis intervention, information and referrals, and assistance with understanding the criminal justice system.
- \$162,592 to the Domestic Violence Prevention Legal Advocacy/Shelter Services/Rural Outreach program to help victims of domestic violence and sexual assault in Bowie and Cass counties by providing shelter, professional counseling, support through the legal process, assistance with obtaining emergency protective orders and transportation to medical services.
- \$70,809 to the Children's Advocacy Center of Smith County to provide services to victims of severe physical or sexual child abuse through forensic interviews, general crisis services, legal advocacy, therapy services, support groups, multi-disciplinary team coordination, and public presentations.
- \$80,000 to the East Texas Crisis Center Victim Assistance Program to provide immediate face-to-face crisis intervention services to ensure the safety of women and their children who have been victims of family violence, sexual assault, and other violent crime in Smith County. Services will include crisis counseling, safety planning, and accompaniment to legal, medical and social service appointments.
- \$80,000 to the Advocacy Center for Children of Galveston County Victim Assistance program to help child abuse victims by providing short-term counseling to the victim and their family members, crisis counseling and therapy following a forensic interview, as well as ongoing therapeutic assessments in order to make appropriate referrals.

- \$80,000 to the Family Time Crisis and Counseling Center Crime Victims Assistance Project to help victims of crime in Harris, Montgomery, Humble and Kingwood counties by providing crisis intervention services, shelter, free individual counseling and support groups, legal advocacy, and information and referrals to other community resources.
- \$73,198 to the Fort Bend County Victim Witness Staff Expansion project to provide crime victims with information and referrals, support during court proceedings and trial preparation, and court accompaniment.
- \$148,700 to the Fort Bend County Child Advocates Inc. Children's Advocacy Center to provide a safe, child-friendly environment for forensic interviews to be conducted by well trained personnel to reduce the number of times a child must recount the abuse experiences.
- \$41,957 to the Fort Bend County Community Supervision and Corrections Department Victim Services Program to help all victims of crime understand the criminal justice process regarding post adjudication court proceedings, receive updates concerning offenders, and collect restitution.
- \$160,000 to the Hardin County Victims' Assistance Center to provide crime victims and their families with services up to and during the prosecution of their case. Services will include a 24-hour hotline, court accompaniment, emergency transportation, assistance with crime victims' compensation claims, and contacting schools, employers or creditors on behalf of the victim.
- \$80,000 to the Harris County Community Supervision and Corrections Department Victim Assistance Program to help victims by providing assistance in collecting restitution owed to the victim, filing protective orders, offering court accompaniment, and providing updates regarding the offender's status.
- \$160,000 to the Houston Area Women's Center Sexual Assault and Hotline Services Program to help victims of sexual assault and domestic violence in Harris County by providing crisis counseling, hospital accompaniment, emergency shelter, information and referrals, as well as access to interpreter services for hearing-impaired victims.
- \$31,017 to the Houston County R.E.S.P.O.N.D. program to provide victims with appropriate emergency assistance, professional counseling, assistance with understanding and participating in the legal process, help filing protective orders and support during court proceedings.
- \$80,000 to the Innovative Alternatives Inc. Victim Assistance Program to help crime victims in Brazoria, Fort Bend, Galveston, Harris, and Montgomery counties by providing free therapy services, counseling, and assistance with the legal system.
- \$64,448 to the Jefferson County Crime Victims' Clearinghouse project to provide service referrals and crisis counseling to violent crime victims through a 24-hour crisis hotline; assist victims with preparing safety plans, protective order applications, and crime victim compensation claims; and operate a program called Project Safe Cell, which distributes 9-1-1 cell phones to victims to prevent and deter future vulnerability and help victims achieve increased safety.
- \$80,000 to the Matagorda County Women's Crisis Center Victim Assistance program to help victims of domestic violence and sexual assault in Matagorda and Wharton counties by providing immediate crisis counseling, emergency shelter, and legal assistance.
- \$144,020 to the Montgomery County Women's Center Family Violence & Sexual Abuse Counseling Services project to help victims of physical and sexual abuse in Montgomery, North

Harris and Northwest Liberty counties by providing shelter, crisis intervention, individual counseling and support groups.

- \$206,218 to the Northwest Assistance Ministries Family Violence Center to assist domestic violence victims within northwest Harris County by offering support services such as crisis counseling, emergency assistance, and individual and family counseling.
- \$80,000 to the Rape & Suicide Crisis of Southeast Texas Sexual Assault/Other Victim Direct Services program to help sexual assault victims in Jefferson, Orange, and Hardin counties by performing individual assessments to determine the services for the victim, which may include crisis counseling, information and referral, assistance through the criminal justice system, a 24-hour hotline, support groups, and assistance with crime victim compensation claims.
- \$132,402 to the Shelter Agencies for Families in East Texas Shelter Project to help domestic violence victims in Titus, Camp, Morris, Franklin and Wood counties by providing a 24-hour hotline, emergency shelter, peer support groups, safety planning and assistance through the legal process.
- \$50,000 to the Smith County Crime Victims Services project to provide direct assistance to victims of crime, including on-scene assistance, court escorts and explanation of rights, personal advocacy, and other services. The project works closely with local service organizations to refer and arrange for shelter services and financial assistance.
- \$80,000 to the The Bridge Over Troubled Waters Inc. Southeast Harris County Victim Services project to help female domestic violence and sexual assault victims in Southeast Harris County by providing emergency shelter, crisis intervention, group counseling, and legal assistance including assistance with protective orders.
- \$80,000 to the Children's Assessment Center Foundation Clinical Services Project to assist sexually abused children in Harris County by providing forensic interviews, psychiatric evaluations and therapy.
- \$79,984 to the Victim Assistance Center Inc. Victim Services Division to help victims of violent crime in Harris County by providing long term therapy, crisis counseling and guidance throughout the criminal justice process.
- \$160,000 to the Walker County Family Violence Council Family Violence/Sexual Abuse Residential Services Project to help family violence and sexual abuse victims in Walker County by providing immediate crisis intervention, short-term emergency shelter, counseling, as well as information about and assistance with the legal process.
- \$80,000 to the Women's Center of East Texas Domestic Violence and Sexual Assault Outreach Services program to reduce the number of domestic violence and sexual assault victims returning to unsafe households in Gregg, Harrison, Marion, and Upshur counties by providing legal advocacy, accompaniment to medical and criminal justice appointments, and offering support groups and safety planning.
- \$80,000 to the Resource and Crisis Center of Galveston County Project Enable to help sexual assault and domestic abuse victims by providing crisis counseling, emergency referrals, a safe shelter and assistance throughout the legal process.

- \$54,750 to the Children's Center Children's Advocacy project to conduct forensic interviews in Lamar and Red River counties in a safe, child-friendly atmosphere using a closed circuit television system which allows for collaborative, comprehensive case management of child abuse cases and limits the number of times the child must discuss the allegations of abuse.
- \$80,000 to the Northeast Texas Child Advocacy Center Child Advocacy Program to help child abuse victims and non-offending caregivers in Wood, Rains, Camp, Delta, Titus, Franklin, Upshur and Hopkins counties by providing support through the crisis phase, professional therapy, and assistance with understanding the criminal justice system, and conducting forensic interviews and sexual assault exams in a safe environment.
- \$80,000 to the Montgomery County Children's Advocacy Center Inc. Children's Safe Harbor Project to help child abuse victims in Montgomery and Walker counties by providing child-friendly forensic interviews during the investigation, mental health services, crisis counseling, follow-up contact, and emotional support.
- \$80,000 to the Justice for Children's Child Abuse Victim Advocacy Project to provide case management services for child victims of abuse in Harris County and surrounding metropolitan areas.. Services also include providing information to the victim and protective parents on the rights of abuse victims, legal remedies, and other recourse through law enforcement, Child Protective Services, and family or juvenile court.
- \$76,500 to the Youth & Family Counseling Service Crime Victims Counseling project to help crime victims in Brazoria County by providing crisis intervention through a 24-hour hotline and up to 12 weeks of intensive professional therapy.
- \$42,800 to the City of Friendswood Crime Victim Assistance Program to help domestic violence and sexual assault victims in Galveston and Harris counties by initially responding to the crime scene and providing crisis counseling and emotional support, hospital accompaniment, information and referrals to needed services, as well as follow up contact after the crisis.
- \$122,000 to the Women's Shelter of East Texas Shelter and Outreach Program to help victims of domestic violence and sexual assault in Angelina, Nacogdoches, Houston, Polk, Sabine, San Augustine, San Jacinto, Shelby, and Trinity counties by providing emergency shelter, case management services, and comprehensive justice support for victims through residential and outreach programs.
- \$70,800 to the Fort Bend County Women's Center Inc. Shelter Program to help domestic violence and sexual assault victims by providing long and short-term shelter, essential food and clothing, legal guidance, case management, and individual and group counseling.
- \$53,413 to the City of Baytown Family Violence Counseling/Victim Services to help victims of violent crimes in Chambers and Harris counties by providing immediate assistance at the crime scene, crisis counseling, court and hospital accompaniment, emergency legal advocacy and referrals to shelter services.
- \$78,660 to the Katy Christian Ministries Domestic Abuse Center to help victims of domestic violence and sexual assault in the Katy and West Houston areas by providing a 24-hour hotline, information and/or referral, crisis counseling, transportation to services, and peer support groups.
- \$44,411 to the 3 "A" Bereavement Foundation Bereaved Family Assistance Program to help family survivors of homicide victims in Harris and Fort Bend counties secure emergency

assistance funds to meet funeral and therapeutic bereavement needs by providing guidance in completing and submitting crime victim compensation forms, general crisis services, and therapy and counseling services.

- \$33,280 to the Rusk County Children Advocacy Center to help child abuse victims through child-friendly digitally recorded forensic interviews and by providing the victims' non-offending caregivers with assistance completing financial assistance forms.
- \$80,000 to the East Texas Child Advocates Children's Advocacy Center of East Texas to help child abuse victims in Gregg and Harrison counties by providing video-taped forensic interviews conducted in a safe, child-friendly environment, support during the sexual assault exam, information about the legal system, and professional counseling.
- \$73,255 to the Montrose Counseling Center Inc. Hate Crime Survivor Services to help victims of hate crimes in Harris, Fort Bend and Montgomery counties by providing a 24-hour hotline, information and referral, crisis counseling and professional counseling.
- \$21,918 to the Newton County Victim Advocate Project, located in the district attorney's office, to help victims who have questions about the legal process, to explain victims rights, and to provide assistance with protective orders. Staff may also accompany victims to court, medical or social service appointments; and provide referrals to other community resources.
- \$34,000 to the Jasper County Criminal District Attorney's Office for a victim assistance coordinator to serve as a legal advocate to crime victims in the Jasper County, who will inform them of indictments and court proceedings related to their case, provide assistance with filing for crime victim compensation, assist with protective order applications, and maintain relationships with non-profit agencies to share information regarding victim's rights.
- \$80,000 to the Garth House Mickey Mehaffy Children's Advocacy Long-term Counseling project to provide long-term individual and group counseling to victims in Hardin, Jefferson, and Orange counties, including therapy conducted in a safe, child-friendly environment.
- \$64,000 to the Wood County Victim Services Project to ensure crime victims receive support by informing victims of their rights and the criminal justice process, accompaniment to court or medical appointments, coordination with other service providers, and assistance with filing protective orders.
- \$160,000 to the Focusing Families Victim Services Counseling Project to help domestic violence and sexual assault victims in Austin, Harris, and Waller counties by providing crisis intervention to callers on the crisis hotline, crisis counseling to residents and non-shelter residents, and assistance with filing protective orders and referrals to community resources.
- \$80,000 to the Brazoria County Alliance for Children's Advocacy Center to help child abuse victims by providing crisis counseling, child-friendly forensic interviews, and guidance throughout the legal process.
- \$78,588 to the Women's Center of Brazoria County Shelter For Domestic Violence Victims to help female domestic violence victims by providing a safe shelter in a confidential location, a 24-hour hotline that provides access to services, crisis counseling, essential food and clothing, and assistance in filing protective orders.

- \$24,000 to the Angelina Alliance for Children Children's Advocacy Center to to help child abuse victims in Angelina County by conducting videotaped forensic interviews with a trained specialist in a child-friendly environment.
- \$20,000 to the Shelby County Children's Advocacy Center for a forensic interviewer to work with multi-disciplinary teams to help child abuse victims by conducting forensic interviews in a safe and child-friendly environment, providing advice and support during the crisis phase, accompanying the victim to court or social services appointments, and helping the victim obtain financial assistance.
- \$62,760 to the Harris County Constable Precinct 7 Victims Assistance Coordinator project to assist crime victims by providing immediate support at the crime scene, accompaniment to hospitals, assistance with obtaining protective orders and compensation forms, and referrals to shelters and counseling services.
- \$25,360 to the Bridgehaven Children's Advocacy Center Crime Victim's Counseling program to help victims of child abuse in Chambers and Liberty counties by providing crisis intervention, professional therapy and counseling, personal advocacy, social service referrals, and follow-up services.
- \$33,706 to the Waller County Victims' Assistant program to help victims of domestic abuse, sexual assault and child abuse by providing assistance in obtaining protective orders, restitution, court accompaniment.
- \$29,861 to the Tyler County Crime Victims Coordinator to help crime victims by informing them of their rights, helping them file for protective orders, and supporting them during the legal process.
- \$50,746 to the City of Dickinson Crime Victim Assistance Program to assist violent crime victims in Galveston County by assigning a crime victims liaison to provide on-scene crisis intervention, transportation and accompaniment to shelter and medical facilities, court accompaniment, and assistance in filing protective orders.
- \$67,764 to the Northeast Texas CASA Texarkana Children's Advocacy Center to help child abuse victims in Bowie and Cass counties by providing a child-friendly, non-threatening facility where professionally trained staff will perform forensic interviews, individual counseling, medical examinations, and provide crisis intervention and follow-up services to assist in stabilizing their lives.
- \$80,000 to the Innovative Alternative's Victim-Offender Mediation Program to assist victims of property crime in Harris, Galveston, Brazoria, Fort Bend and Montgomery counties.
- \$64,000 to the Chambers County Family Violence Counseling and Victim Services to provide a liaison within the sheriff's office to assist domestic violence and sexual assault victims in Chambers County through crisis intervention, hospital accompaniment, shelter referrals, and assistance in filing protective orders.
- \$30,045 to the Family Tie "Just for Kids" Victim Services Project to assist child victims of violent crime in Austin, Harris, and Waller counties by providing therapy, mental health assessments, advocacy and case management.

- \$31,760 to the Bridgehaven Children's Advocacy Center program support coordinator to help child abuse victims in Chambers and Liberty counties by making initial contact with the victim and their family upon completion of a forensic interview to provide follow-up services throughout the duration of the case. The coordinator will also track court proceedings and may accompany the families to court as needed.
- \$24,759 to the Family Services of Southeast Texas Pineywoods Safehouse and Outreach Services to help domestic violence victims in Jasper, Newton and Tyler counties by providing a safe shelter, 24-hour emergency services hotline, emotional support during the crisis phase, information about community resources, assistance with completing financial aid forms, and accompaniment to law enforcement, medical and social services appointments.
- \$40,907 to the Montgomery County Children's Advocacy Center Counseling for Sexually Abused Children Project to help child victims in Montgomery and Waller counties by providing weekly peer support groups and professional counseling that includes play and cognitive therapy.

North Texas:

- \$160,000 to the Johnson County Family Crisis Center Inc. Victim Advocacy Program to help victims of sexual assault in Johnson and Somervell counties by providing a hotline, personal advocacy, information and referral, crisis counseling, peer support groups, hospital accompaniment, and professional therapy.
- \$89,481 to the Legal Aid Society of Lubbock Inc. Domestic Violence Division to help victims of domestic violence in Lubbock, Crosby, Garza, Lynn, Terry, Hockley, Lamb, Hale, and Floyd counties by providing legal counsel, representation in court matters, and ensuring that protective orders are obtained and enforced.
- \$80,000 to the New Beginning Center Inc. Crisis Intervention Shelter for Family Violence Victims program to provide victims of domestic abuse in Dallas County with emergency shelter, crisis intervention, legal services, case management, information and referrals, counseling, and safety planning.
- \$97,756 to the Children's Advocacy Center of South Plains Child Advocacy Project to assist child abuse victims in Bailey, Cochran, Crosby, Dickens, Floyd, Garza, Hale, Hockley, King, Lamb, Lubbock, Lynn, Motley, Terry, and Yoakum counties by providing individual, family, and group therapy, medical evaluations, crisis counseling and child-friendly forensic interviews.
- \$56,440 to the City of Grand Prairie Victim Assistance Program to help crime victims by providing emergency assistance, information and referral, follow-up contact, justice support and advocacy, and assistance in filing for protective orders and crime victim compensation.
- \$80,000 to the City of Irving Domestic Violence Counselors to help domestic violence victims in Dallas County by providing crisis counseling, information and referrals, helping victims through the legal system and developing safety plans.
- \$127,900 to the Collin County Children's Advocacy Center Inc. to help children of physical/sexual abuse and neglect, and their non-offending family members, in Collin County by conducting forensic interviews as efficient and child friendly as possible and providing emergency aid, information and/or referrals, advocacy, counseling, and therapeutic treatment/therapy all to reduce the victims, and their non-offending family members, trauma and experience improved living circumstances and stability.

- \$80,000 to the Hope's Door Residential Program to provide victims of domestic violence in Collin County with crisis services, shelter, emergency transportation, safety planning, advocacy, case management, 24-hour crisis hotline, and access to legal assistance that will increase the victims' safety, knowledge of the dynamics of family violence, and ability to access community assistance.
- \$80,000 to the Dallas County Protective Order Case Manager project to provide free and streamlined assistance with protective orders, legal advocacy and crisis services for victims of crime in Dallas County. These services increase the safety of victims by providing an effective legal measure of protection that deters physical contact between victims and their abuser.
- \$76,978 to the Family Support Services of Amarillo Victim Assistance Program to help domestic violence and sexual assault victims in Potter and Randall counties by providing emotional and physical support, assistance with understanding the criminal justice process, and individual and group therapy.

- \$112,654 to the City of San Antonio Project EASE (Educate, Assess, Serve, and Empower) program administered by the victims services section of the San Antonio Police Department to help hearing impaired victims in Bexar County by providing an Internet-based interpretation service functioning within six police substations that assists victims in crisis situations and provides information regarding available services. A certified interpreter will also be available to provide counseling, support groups, assistance with completing compensation forms and filing police reports, and referrals for other services.
- \$98,962 to the Seton Home Project Safe Haven to help homeless pregnant women, parenting teens and their children who are victims of crime in Bexar County by providing a 24-hour secure residential facility, crisis counseling, therapy, information and referrals, and legal advocacy.
