GRACE Week of Prayer to End Human Trafficking

January 6 - 12, 2025

Every January, the Governor's Response Against Child Exploitation (GRACE) hosts a Week of Prayer to End Human Trafficking. Faith communities across Texas are encouraged to unite in prayer, become better educated about human trafficking, and discern opportunities to prevent exploitation and support survivors.

Join GRACE for a virtual interfaith launch event on Monday, January 6th at 7:00 p.m. on Facebook. Texans can also use the hashtag #TXPraysToEndHT on social media to share their support for the Week of Prayer to End Human Trafficking.

During this week of prayer, Texans of all faiths and religious backgrounds are encouraged to pray about the issue of human trafficking in whatever manner they choose. In a spirit of solidarity and interfaith collaboration, GRACE members humbly offer these daily intentions for those Texans wishing to focus their prayers. Beginning Tuesday, January 7th, a new video featuring different faith leaders and survivors will be posted on the Office of the Governor's Facebook page to guide viewers through the day's intention.

- Monday, January 6th: Pray that the demand for human trafficking will decrease and that all who may be vulnerable to trafficking receive the help, love, and support they need to prevent them from experiencing victimization.
- Tuesday, January 7th: Pray that our hearts and minds will be open to recognizing the signs of human trafficking in our communities, and that Texans will have the awareness and courage to speak up when they see behavior that puts others at risk.
- Wednesday, January 8th: Pray for trauma-informed, victim-centered, innovative investigations that successfully recover those being trafficked.
- Thursday, January 9th: Pray for complete healing for all who are currently being exploited, or who have been exploited in the past.
- **Friday, January 10th:** Pray that child welfare workers, law enforcement officers, prosecutors, judges, and all others involved in the justice system will have the strength to endure, and that justice prevails.
- Saturday, January 11th: Pray that children, women, and men who are currently being exploited will find safety quickly, and that they are able to remain safe as they start to heal.
- **Sunday, January 12th:** Pray for discernment on the actions you can personally take to prevent human trafficking.


Caught in the System: The Intersection of Human Trafficking and Forced Criminality

Human Trafficking Prevention Month Agency Spotlight

The Office of the Attorney General's (OAG) Human Trafficking and Transnational Organized Crime (HTTOC) Division was established in 2023 to fight and end human trafficking in the State of Texas through aggressive criminal prosecution and civil actions to hold offenders accountable. Through the civil side of their division led by Assistant Attorney General, Alicia Crowley, HTTOC works to identify and shut down Illicit Massage Businesses throughout Texas. An Illicit Massage Business (IMB) is a massage establishment that serves as a front for a commercial sex operation, often involving victims of human trafficking.


Throughout the state, there are approximately over 1,000 IMBs and unfortunately, they are very easy to set up due to the low overhead and infrastructure. HTTOC works directly with landlords through their Landlord Engagement Program to notify the landlord that there is an IMB operating on their premises. These notifications come in the form of a letter that is sent from

the OAG that includes evidence of the IMB, a list of landlord responsibilities, and next steps for the landlord. After the letter is sent, the landlord has ten days to contact the OAG to begin removing the illicit business.

Since November 2023, HTTOC has shut down 18 IMBs and sent out 67 letters to landlords resulting in 4 nuisance abatement lawsuits. Recently, the OAG helped shut down Essence Massage and Sun Spa in Austin, Texas after investigating and finding evidence of illicit sexual and criminal activity.

National Human Trafficking Hotline – Call the toll-free hotline at 1-888-373-7888. Tips made to the hotline are reviewed and routed to local law enforcement. This hotline also offers 24/7 confidential support for survivors.

<u>Texas Child Abuse Hotline</u> - Report child neglect and abuse, including sexual exploitation of a child, to the Texas Abuse Hotline at 1-800-252-5400.
