

As we approach the end of 2024 and begin planning for 2025, we want to extend our deepest gratitude to the SASTF Steering Committee, Task Force members, working group members, and survivor leaders for their continued efforts to improve Texas' response to sexual violence.

In this issue of our newsletter, we offer sincere thanks to former Task Force/Steering Committee member, Liz Boyce, and our Fall Intern, Mark Eliff. We also spotlight current SASTF Survivor-Centered Working Group Member, Brittany Johnston, for her work with Alliance for Children and advocating for child survivors of sexual abuse. Finally, we highlight funding opportunities through the Office of the Governor's Public Safety Office, along with upcoming training opportunities.

SASTF Activities – 2024 Summary

- Collaborated with the Office of the Attorney General to **remove** the requirement for law enforcement to authorize a sexual assault forensic medical exam for exams after August 31, 2023, and **streamline** the Crime Victims' Compensation process.
- Implemented two new subject matter expert working groups: the Judicial Working Group and the Leadership in Law Enforcement Working Group.
- Developed a one-hour mandated sexual assault training for hospital emergency room administrative staff.
- Translated the <u>Sexual Assault Survivors' Rights Guide</u> for adult survivors into six additional languages, including Spanish, to ensure it can be widely utilized by individuals who speak languages other than English
- Added a new service category, Specialized Services for Male Survivors, to the <u>Resources for Sexual Assault Survivors Online Directory</u> to assist male survivors more easily identifying providers in their communities.
- Launched a new <u>Quarterly Webinar Series</u>.

- Continued to work closely with the Texas Department of Public Safety to ensure law enforcement agencies meet statutory guidelines for submitting Sexual Assault Kits (SAKs) to crime laboratories for processing.
- Completed focused working group discussions on Whole Survivor Care Guiding Principles #1 #4, a preliminary articulation of statewide standards for best practices for funding and provision of services to survivors.
- Submitted the <u>2024 SASTF Biennial Report to the Texas Legislature</u>.

We are deeply honored to continue this work on behalf of all Texans, particularly those who have been impacted by sexual violence. Again, our heartfelt thanks to all of you who made these memorable moments and milestones possible, and our best wishes for a safe and happy holiday season. We look forward to seeing you in 2025!

Community Efforts and Successes

Soft Interview Room Installation at Lubbock Christian University Police Department

Chief Mike Smith, member of the SASTF's Leadership in Law Enforcement Working Group, and Stacy Terrell, member of the SASTF's Survivor-Centered Working Group, teamed up with Tracy Matheson, Task Force Member and Founder of <u>Project Beloved:</u> <u>The Molly Jane Mission</u>, to install a Soft Interview Room for sexual assault survivors at the Lubbock Christian University Police Department. Soft rooms help survivors feel physically and emotionally safer, minimize the potential for re-traumatization, and have a positive impact on a survivor's ability to participate in the investigative interview process.

This collaborative project also brought together <u>One Voice</u>, a nonprofit serving both teenage and young women who have been sex trafficked in Lubbock and surrounding areas, and the <u>Voice of Hope</u>, Lubbock's rape crisis center that provides support to all

persons impacted by sexual violence through advocacy, awareness, and collaboration. The Lubbock Christian University Associates participated in the project by funding the video and audio equipment, and the furniture and decoration for the Soft Interview Room were donated by Project Beloved.

Statewide Electronic Tracking System Report

Texas Government Code, Section <u>420.034</u> (h) requires the Texas Department of Public publish the "Statewide Electronic Tracking System Report" by December 1st of each year. The report uses data from the Texas Sexual Assault Evidence Tracking System, also known as Track-Kit, to identify the number of sexual assault evidence kits that have not yet been submitted for laboratory analysis or for which laboratory analysis has not yet been completed. **Track-Kit only tracks evidence kits collected on or after September 1, 2019.**

District Attorney Forensic Evidence Grant Program

The purpose of this announcement is to solicit applications from district attorney offices for costs associated with the forensic analysis of physical evidence.

Sexual Assault Evidence Testing Grant Program

The purpose of this announcement is to solicit applications from law enforcement agencies for costs associated with the forensic analysis of physical evidence in relation to sexual assault or other sex offenses.

Sexual Assault Forensic Exam (SAFE)-Ready Facilities Program

The purpose of this announcement is to solicit applications from hospital facilities seeking to achieve or maintain a Sexual Assault Forensic Exam (SAFE)-Ready designation, as well as non-profit corporations seeking to operate or maintain a SAFE Program as defined in Chapter 323 of the Texas Health and Safety Code.

Types of continuing education eligible through the SAFE-Ready Facilities Grant funding include:

- Foundational SANE education courses (adult/adolescent & pediatric)
- Conferences related to forensic health care topics
- Leadership education/courses/conferences for SANE coordinators
- Preceptor training courses
- Coaching/mentoring courses
- Competency assessments
- Simulation courses
- Certification prep courses and examinations
- Education materials such as reference books
- Licenses for electronic materials for education

Violence Against Women Justice and Training Program

The purpose of this announcement is to solicit applications for projects that promote a coordinated, multi-disciplinary approach to improve the justice system's response to violent crimes against women, including domestic violence, sexual assault, dating violence, and stalking.

General Victim Assistance Grant Program

The purpose of this program is to provide services and assistance directly to victims of crime to speed their recovery and aid them through the criminal justice process.

Services may include the following:

- Responding to the emotional and physical needs of crime victims;
- Assisting victims in stabilizing their lives after a victimization;
- Assisting victims to understand and participate in the criminal justice system; and
- Providing victims with safety and security.
