



## Defense Economic Adjustment Assistance Grant (DEAAG)

- DEAAG is a grant program designed to assist defense communities that have been positively or negatively impacted.
- Funding is available to local municipalities, counties, defense base development authority, junior college districts and Texas State Technical College campuses, and regional planning commissions representing these communities.
- Funds can also be used to meet matching requirements for federal funding.
- Grants awarded may range from \$50,000 to \$5 million per project.

## Defense Economic Adjustment Assistance Grant (DEAAG)

- During the 86<sup>th</sup> Legislative Session the Texas Legislature appropriated \$30 million for DEAAG in FY 2020-2021
- DEAAG will be split between fiscal years 2020 and 2012
- The application for 2020 is now available on our website and is due by 28 February 2020 at 5:00 PM CST.

- Austin Community College \$2 million
  Building a Sensitive Compartmented Information

- City of Kingsville \$144 thousand,
  Purchase of property to prevent encroachment
  around Naval Air Station Kingsville
- City of Abilene \$282 thousand, Improvements to Dyess Air Force Base Security Fence
- Port San Antonio \$5 million, Airfield Operations Upgrades and Improvements, JBSA

## Texas Military Value Revolving Loan Fund (TMVRLF)

The Revolving Loan Fund provides a low cost source of funding for eligible communities that have been negatively or positively impacted by BRAC or a project that adds military value.


- Minimum amount: \$1,000,000, maximum amount is determined by the availability of funds and the creditworthiness of the applicant.
- State funding is obtained through the sale of state general obligation bonds.
- \$204 million in bond authority is currently available to lend to defense communities.




### Legislative Changes: House Bills

- HB 1 included \$30 million DEAAG. Signed by the Governor, Effective 1 SEP 2019
- HB 696 Relating to employment and referral services for veterans and military service members. Signed by the Governor, Effective Immediately
- HB 1597 Relating to establishing residency for the purposes of admission into public schools. Signed by the Governor, Effective Immediately
- HB 2119 Relating to the application for and loans from the Texas military value revolving loan account. (Similar to SB 2131 but includes Open Meetings Act information) Signed by the Governor, Effective 1 SEP 2019
- HB 2214 Relating to the issuance of a temporary occupational license to certain military service members, military veterans, and military spouses. (Expedited equivalent license) Signed by the Governor, Effective 1 SEP 2019
- HB 2530 Relating to the development by the Texas Veterans Commission of an online repository of information of use to active duty military relocating to this state. Signed by the Governor, Effective 1 SEP 2019



### Legislative Changes: Senate Bills

- SB 1200 Relating to the authority of certain military spouses to engage in a business or occupation in this state. (License Equivalency) Signed by the Governor, Effective 1 SEP 2019
- SB 1443 Relating to the Texas Military Preparedness Commission. (Does away with statutory grant criteria, moves expiration date of task force from AUG 2021 to AUG 2023) Signed by the Governor, Effective 1 SEP 2019
- SB 2131 Relating to state assistance provided by the Texas Military Preparedness Commission to defense communities. (Similar to HB 2119) Signed by the Governor, Effective 1 SEP 2019
